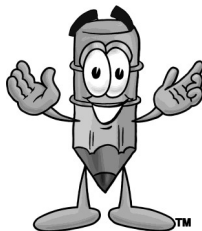
Once a student is accepted in to a program, all communication will come directly from the program moderator. Any general questions can be directed toward the school office.

Power of the Pencil is a writing club for students who love to write, want to improve their writing, or who want to find more time for writing in a relaxed, fun, and supportive atmosphere. Writers can choose their own topics and genres, but will also participate in group writing, pass around stories, prompt writing, and other suggested writing activities that will help each student grow and gain confidence as a writer. Students who are interested can also enter writing contests or seek to have their writing published. Collaboration with peers enhances the writing experience, so there will be many opportunities to work with other student writers. An end of the year Power of the Pencil magazine will be published with featured writing from each club member and presented at the end of the year pizza party. All writing supplies are provided. This club experience can help students prepare for the Power of the Pen club and competition team in 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grades.

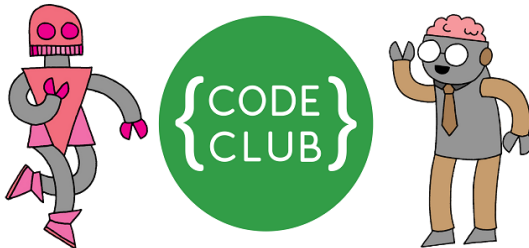




# Girls/Boys Coding Clubs

National Novel Writing Month (NaNoWriMo for short) is a nonprofit organization that challenges adult participants to write a novel in 30 days every November...and they have a Young Writers Program! The YWP edition of NaNo is designed for classrooms and helps students set individual writing goals. Whether your child wants to write a novel, write 30 short stories, or something in between, the program encourages daily writing at a liberating speed towards a goal.

The purpose of this club/challenge is to give students time, space, and resources for 30 days of creativity. Students can participate in the challenge at home or during and of the writing sessions offered in Room 301, such as before school or during Homework Table. We will set goals and prepare during “Setup Day,” and at the end of the 30 days, Mrs. Hardin will help students make decisions about submitting their stories for any relevant contests or publication.
